Over 7,500 people participated in ANC programs and activities in 2007 alone! 

Litter on the Eastside— Pick it Up!

We are all glad that this winter's snow has finally melted. But that beautiful white (or ugly grey) snow was covering up a dirty secret—litter. All the trash that was buried and hidden can now be seen dirtying the streets of the Eastside.

Bottles, fast food wrappers, and cigarette butts are the main problems along our major streets. Allen Neighborhood Center is no stranger to this problem. We are constantly battling the tide of trash in our parking lot and on our street. And I am sure you all are concerned about driving or walking on broken glass, or your child playing with someone's garbage at the local park.

Have you ever heard of the "broken window theory"? This idea says that one broken window in a house in a neighborhood leads to more broken windows, and then further decay. People take it as a sign that nobody cares about the area, which means it is not such a good place to live. On the other hand, it also says that one newly painted house, or planted yard, encourages other neighbors to invest in their homes. It shows people care about the neighborhood and it is a good place to live.

This applies to trash: one piece of garbage leads to lots of pieces of garbage, and may lead to people dumping whole bags of garbage in a place. It sends a signal that it is okay to throw trash on the ground here. But, a very clean street shows people that it is **not** okay to throw trash on the ground.

The Eastside can do better!

There are many ways to reduce trash in our neighborhood. Households can get together to take care of the street in front of their own homes. Families can work together to pick up trash in our parks. Clean-up days are an excellent service project for clubs or organizations. And whole blocks or neighborhoods can organize massive clean-up days that leave the whole place looking spotless!

Complete Streets:

A Must for Lansing

A movement called Complete Streets is gaining great momentum across the nation and Michigan. More importantly, Complete Streets is finding a voice closer to home right here in Lansing. It is a simple concept that redefines how we look at our roadways. Rather than building roads to move only *cars*, Complete Streets calls for road design to move *people*. Whether you get around by car or wheelchair, bike or foot, our roadways should and need to safely accommodate *all* users.



There is no single formula to "complete" a street. Sidewalks, bike lanes, and crosswalk signals with countdown timers are a few simple solutions. Some communities are lowering speeds and implementing "road diets" (see *article at right*) that transform excess lanes on multi lane roads into safe, comfortable spaces for pedestrians and bicyclists. Wider shoulders and pedestrian refuge medians in busy roads are also proven to lower traffic accidents. In fact bike lanes reduce bike crashes by 30% to 50% according to numerous published studies.

With 653 people being hit while walking or bicycling in Lansing between 2000-2006, Lansing could not be a better candidate for Complete Streets. During that same period,

Lansing had 13 fatalities of pedestrians and bicyclists; mostly children or seniors. Nearly half of Lansing's population does not drive because of age, income and/or physical disability, yet traveling Lansing's current transportation network on foot or by bicycle is often dangerous and inconvenient.

In addition to public safety, Complete Streets provide a local opportunity to combat the daily headlines of Michigan's obesity epidemic, high gas prices, global warming, crime and our sliding economy. Greener transportation options are becoming more desirable and mainstream. Walking and biking not only help people get in shape, but they also save people money on expensive gas while lowering air and noise pollution.

More people traveling outside of their cars puts more "eyes" on the streets, which can help lower crime. This also puts people closer to storefronts, which translates into increased sales and a boosted economy. Additional financial benefits of Complete Streets are found in increased property values. Homes located in highly walkable communities command a premium of up to 25% of the home's value compared to surrounding areas.

As our city develops its new master plan over the next 18 months, it would no doubt benefit the entire community to incorporate Complete Streets as a guiding principle.

ENO Holds Forum on Saginaw/Oakland

The Eastside Neighborhood Organization is hosting an informational meeting on **Tuesday, April 1st, at 7:00 in room 213 of Foster Center**, to discuss a proposal by the NorthWest Initiative (an organization serving people on the west and northwest of Lansing) to consider a "road diet" for Saginaw and Oakland.

The NorthWest Initiative is hoping to start a conversation about the possibility of reducing the number of excess lanes and using the space to create bike lanes, sidewalks, and green space. This would make them more friendly for people who walk, bike, play, and live along these two streets, both of which are thought to be under-capacity (carrying too little traffic for the number of lanes).

Studies show road diets slow down dangerous traffic and lead to fewer car accidents. They also reduce the number of accidents involving people walking and people on bikes. Road diets reduce noise, and increase the treescape of the area.

Spicy Bean Salsa

12 Servings of guilt-free snacking!

- 1 (15 ounce) can black-eyed peas
- 1 (15 ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 (15 ounce) can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped green bell pepper
- 1 (4 ounce) can diced jalapeno peppers
- 1 (14.5 ounce) can diced tomatoes, drained
- 1 cup Italian-style salad dressing
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt



In a medium bowl, combine black-eyed peas, black beans, corn, onion, green bell pepper, jalapeno peppers and tomatoes. Season with Italian-style salad dressing and garlic salt; mix well. Cover, and refrigerate overnight to blend flavors.

• What's growing in the GardenHouse?

 During April, vegetables in the GardenHouse are mostly "cool-season crops," like salad mix, head lettuce, and cooking greens (kale, collards, spinach, Chinese cabbage, Swiss chard). In mid-April, we will add warm-season crops like tomatoes and peppers, taking advantage of greenhouse conditions to get a jump on the season. We are also planting seeds for many annual flowers that will be planted in the neighborhoods in May and June, and starting transplants of many vegetables to give to home gardeners on the Eastside.
