GardenHouse Set for 2007 Completion

Many neighbors have been eagerly awaiting the construction of the Hunter Park GardenHouse, but due to delays steel frame, pre-punched and boltrelated to lengthy bid processes and together design, with (soft) poly questions about utility installation, the roof, hard polycarbonate end and structure will not go up until spring. After exploring the options, ANC staff, Friends of Hunter Park, and representatives from Lansing Parks and Recreation and the Building Department have decided on a two step process: installation of water and electric lines yet this fall, followed by actual construction of the GardenHouse in the spring. If utility work is done this year, we can move quickly into actual construction in the spring, when we are more likely to have the 55 degree weather needed to insure that the polyurethane roofing can be properly stretched and connected.

For those of you who are curious about these sorts of things, the model we have purchased is a 30 X 96 foot, Conley's Superstar Series 3600 Greenhouse of galvanized side walls, rack and pinion roof vent, and double sliding door.

Never fear-the Hunter Park GardenHouse will be built—hopefully in time for our "Garden Startin" Workshops this spring. Meanwhile, our staff and neighborhood committees are working on creating a welldesigned and purposeful space, including raised beds, worktables, teaching area, etc. Our patience will be well rewarded, and we believe that we will have in the Hunter Park GardenHouse an educational model for the city and the region.

Entertainment Express

You may have seen a trolley traveling between Lansing and East Lansing's downtown areas. This is the Entertainment Express, a service of CATA that runs year round on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings from 7:30 PM until 2:30 AM. This service is a fun way to link Lansing and East Lansing's businesses and entertainment venues, and CATA hopes it will attract young professionals, college students, and visitors to the area and let them more easily enjoy our cities' nightlife.

The trolley's route is a condensed version of CATA's Route # 1 service. The trolley connects Lansing and East Lansing downtowns as an express option to your favorite entertainment venues. In the event the Trolley is at capacity, patrons can simply ride a Route 1 bus onward to their destinations. The Trolley costs \$1.00 per trip with a \$.50 cent discount fare for students, persons with disabilities and seniors. Payment methods are the same as regular CATA buses.

Lansing Catholic High School

Lansing Catholic is the only Catholic high school in the Lansing area. The school has formed close partnerships with the community, including a cooperative venture with Eastern High School to build a shared football stadium. We spoke with Eileen Gianjodis about LCHS' efforts.

EN: How do you encourage ties between the school and the community?

EG: All of our students complete 20 hours of community service a year. Many of our students live on the Eastside of Lansing. Several of our teachers have invited community members into their classrooms to talk about their jobs. We have a day where 8th graders come in and spend the day, from Catholic and public schools.

EN: What do you think draws non-Catholic families to send their kids here?

EG: We have an excellent academic program—96 to 98% of our seniors go on to the college of their choice; we have a strong college planning program. Our teachers are extremely dedicated—they're often here after school and before school, preparing lessons or meeting with students. The Lansing Catholic community is one that people really cherish and love to be a part of.

EN: How do you build community in a school setting?

EG: We have students from many places—Howell, Grand Ledge, DeWitt, Owosso—and once they're here, they form a community of kids who are interested in success and academics, and learning more about and practicing their faith. Our connection with the Catholic faith gives us shared rituals—the mass, the sacraments and also a shared value system. I think families appreciate that we keep their values in place. Every student takes 4 theology credits, one class each year. It's an academically oriented study of Church thinking and history. They're experiencing a different worldview if they're non-Catholic. Having the opportunity to explore a world that they may not be familiar with—that's important for all kids.

Coping with Holiday Stress By Julia Herzog

The holiday season can be a time of stress and depression. The three main triggers of this are relationships, finances, and physical demands.

Here are some things you can do to cope with holiday stress: acknowledge your feelings, seek support from those around you, be realistic about change (what the holidays were once like, may not be what they are like for you now), stick to a budget, don't abandon healthy habits, and remember to take time for yourself.

Here is a list of the local resources for handling the emotional, financial, and physical stressors of the holiday season:

Basic Needs & Financial Support:

The **Salvation Army** provides help with food needs, housing placement, personal supplies, and utilities. For any type of assistance, clients need to bring in a picture ID with correct address, social security numbers of adults 18 and older, and food stamp case number. They also have a Community Kitchen that serves meals on Monday and Friday from noon until 1:00. 484-4424, 525 N. Pennsylvania, Lansing

Allen Neighborhood Center offers a Bread Basket program (Free Bread Distribution) on Tuesdays: 1:00 - 6:00 and Free Over-the-Counter Medications on December 19^{th} , 1:00 - 4:30.

Michigan Works offers adult literacy programs, counseling for laid-off workers, income tax help, a job bank, help with resume writing and interviewing skills, a Work First program for welfare recipients, youth job development, and a work clothing boutique. 492-5500

Emotional Support:

St. Vincent Catholic Charities provides a variety of programs including counseling, parent aide, youth mentor-

ing, and services for refugees. Their Family Counseling Center provides counseling for families, children, and adults. They will work with people of all income levels, with or without insurance. 323-4734

The Listening Ear Crisis Center offers free crisis counseling and referrals 24 hours a day. If you are stressed or depressed this holiday season, calling the crisis hotline (337-1717), is one way of reaching out for support.

Keep Holiday Gifts Safe

The season of gift-giving is here. If you have little ones to shop for this year, keep in mind that many common children's toys and household goods are made with a toxic material called PVC.

PVC (polyvinyl chloride) plastic, commonly called vinyl, can damage immune and reproductive systems and may contribute to cancer.

How do you avoid PVC? You can avoid plastic all together and choose toys made from wood or cloth.



Wooden blocks and cars are always favorites and hard to destroy.




Cloth dolls are available that do not have plastic



"Dress-up" clothes can be anything in your closet that you no longer use including jackets, dresses, shoes, hats, sunglasses or regular glasses without the lenses, bags or briefcases.



Craft items are inexpensive and fun—it's always a thrill to get a new pack of crayons, markers, paper, scissors, etc.



Even though it is plastic, PVC is much less recyclable than other plastics because it releases harmful gases when processed.

You can also choose plastic toys made without PVC. The following manufacturers have committed to not using PVC in their products: Brio, Lego, Early Start, Gerber, Tiny Love, Safety First, and Chicco.

Winter Walking Tips

Don't let the cold weather keep you indoors. Make walking and being outside more comfortable this winter with the following tips.

Dress in Layers

Wearing multiple layers of clothing allows you to shed a layer after your body has adjusted to the temperature outside. Dressing too warmly may cause you to sweat and feel chilled.

Wear a hat, gloves and scarf

Your body temperature may drop when your head, neck and hands are not covered. These areas are also more at risk to frostbite. If you notice your skin becoming pale, ashy looking, or numb to the touch, go indoors immediately.

Keep your feet warm and dry

Wear hiking boots or other waterproof shoes when heading out in snowy weather conditions. Choose boots that are a little larger than your normal shoe size so that you can wear warmer and heavier socks.

We are investigating ways to keep the walking path at Hunter Park cleared of snow and ice on a regular basis. Consider it as an option to keep yourself moving this winter!

This holiday season, you can feel good about saying, "pass the cranberries". Cranberries are high in fiber and Vitamins A, B, and C. Recent scientific findings prove that cranberries can help ward off infections. They also contain health promoting antioxidants, which may prevent cancer and heart disease. Fresh, frozen, juiced, or dried, these berries are healthy and delicious!

Now that you know how healthy those little red berries can be try this easy, yummy recipe for your holiday dinner.

Yam and Cranberry Casserole

Ingredients

- 1 (40 ounces) can yams, drained
- 3 cups (12 ounces) fresh whole cranberries
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 1 small orange, sliced
- 1/2 cup pecan halves
- 1/4 cup orange juice (or brandy)
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/8 teaspoon mace

Instructions

Wash cranberries. Combine with sugar, orange slices, pecan halves, orange juice and spices in a 2-quart casserole. Bake, uncovered, at 375 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Stir yams into cranberry mixture; bake until hot through, about 15 minutes. Yield: 8 servings
