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**Parents Organize to Keep Resurrection School Open**

Parents of students at Resurrection School are organizing and raising funds for keeping the school open. Financial troubles and declining enrollment are threatening the future of the 79-year-old Catholic school. The parents have formed a group called "Save Our Shamrocks" (SOS) and organized a steering committee to manage their effort, with subcommittees for marketing, fundraising, strategic planning, facilities, and spiritual growth. Their first few events have been remarkably successful: a golf outing in August, an all-night prayer vigil in September, and a spaghetti dinner in October that drew over 700 supporters, with delicious pasta donated by Emil's. The group's next event will be a silent and live auction on Nov. 12th, 7 PM at the Parish Hall, with a Miracle March later in the month.

The fundraisers are intended to help with operating expenses for the next year. But ultimately, the decision to close the school or not will be made by Bishop Carl Mengeling of the Diocese of Lansing.

SOS is eager to work with the bishop to address concerns in order to keep the school open. Some parishioners have expressed frustration at the lack of communication and dialogue between the diocese and school stakeholders.

**New Pattengill Construction on Schedule**

Masonry walls are being erected for the new Pattengill Middle School at 626 Marshall Street. The \$30 million project is on schedule for students to move in second semester of the 2006-2007 school year.

The 175,000-square-foot school is being paid for with a \$67.5 million bond approved by voters in 2003.

As the walls go up, slabs are being poured, ductwork is being installed and underground utilities are being laid.

The school district had not built a middle school or high school for 35 years. It would have cost more to renovate the 85-year-old Pattengill than to build a new one. The new building will offer modern musical and art facilities. It is designed to accommodate the latest teaching philosophies and be more energy efficient.

The old Pattengill will be demolished and the land converted to green space around Eastern High School.

"On the Eastside of Lansing, there were two families -the Demps and the Dennings". Thus began a remembrance to the family matriarch at her funeral. When bread was baked at the Demps, or Sunday Dinner was served, you could count on the neighborhood coming over. When the hobos hopped off the train, they knocked on the Demps' door for a can of peaches, sat out back, and told stories to the children. And the doors were always unlocked. We remember this time in loving memory of Mrs. Geraldine Catherine Demps, March 18, 1925-September 21, 2005.

## Business Spotlight: Neogen and Women's Center of Greater Lansing

**Neogen**, an Eastside-based bio-tech company, has opened a new plant on Shiawassee. It houses a manufacturing operation, which produces dehydrated culture media. This is used in food production, drug research, and breweries, and in tests for food contamination. The new plant has 40 employees, but may add more for a second or even third shift.

Neogen has been in Lansing for 22 years. Its CEO, James Herbert, is active with the governor in promoting small businesses in Michigan. Neogen has also taken old buildings and renovated them into new facilities. The new plant is in the former Dudley Paper building. Company headquarters on Leshar was originally Oak Park School, and had been standing empty for several years when Neogen bought it. "We can really help the city out and buy the discarded buildings off their hands," said Rod Poland, director of corporate communications. "Our CEO really enjoys the refurbishment."

James Herbert has also been active in the neighborhood in other ways. James and Judy Herbert opened their house to the public for the 2005 Eastside Home and Community Tour, and have been long-time supporters of Eastern Neighbors and Oak Park.

**SCHOOL, continued from page 1** recommendation to the bishop suggesting consolidation, closing some schools and sending kids to other schools. We're trying to show the diocese and bishop that we have a very close, family-oriented atmosphere and we don't want to lose that," said Janice Harvey, mother of two current students. "We don't understand why they don't think our school is worth fighting for."

In late spring Save Our Shamrocks surveyed the 81 families that have children at Resurrection, and received 55 responses. 80% did not favor a consolidation that might result in their children attending school in another location. When asked if they would remain in the parish if the school closed, 60% said no. The group also surveyed 259 parishioners over four masses, and found that 61% did not support a consolidation. While 73% of respondents did not have a child or other relative currently attending Resurrection, parishioners were still strongly opposed to closing the school.

From its founding in 1922 by Father John Gabriels, parishioners of Resurrection have valued Catholic education. For many, the ongoing vitality of the parish is strongly linked to the school and its mission.

The possible closing of Resurrection is a concern for the neighborhood as well. A main draw for young families is the presence of educational options, including parochial schools, and with the closing of Allen Street School last June, those options are becoming narrower.

### Breast Health vs. Breast Cancer

The thought of breast cancer can be a scary thing. There are ways to break free from the fear around breast cancer and actively move towards breast health!

- Think about what you are eating...wash pesticides off food and try incorporating some cancer fighting food into your diet. They include, avocados, broccoli, cauliflower, walnuts, tofu, sweet potatoes, and many more.
- Become more active...take a walk around the block for join a recreational sports team. The more physically fit you are, the lower your chance of developing breast cancer.
- Breathe clean air...industrial and car pollutants can be harmful so step away from them. Second-hand smoke is particularly harmful so leave the room when people start smoking and insist upon sitting in the non-smoking section in restaurants.
- Think about early detection...doing a monthly breast self-exam can help reassure you that your breasts are healthy. In fact, the vast majority of lumps found are *not cancerous*. If you need a reminder, join our Breast Health Club and receive a monthly postcard reminder.
- Get a yearly clinical breast exam from a doctor or nurse practitioner. If you're over 40, get a yearly mammogram. *Free and low cost* mammograms are available. Call the health team to find out if you qualify.



### Disparities Abound

Studies have shown that barriers to access and quality health care are largely responsible for disparities in diagnosis and survival rate. Some key facts:



- Despite a lower incidence rate, African American women have a 32 percent higher death rate from breast cancer than Caucasian women.
- Among women of Hispanic origin, breast cancer is more frequently diagnosed at a later stage, when fewer treatment options are available.
- In a recent study, when Caucasian, African American and Hispanic women were provided equal access to high-quality mammography screening, all groups had similar rates of breast cancer survival.
